LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

Dear Friends,

The need for affordable housing as an element of a vibrant and thriving community has never been more important. So the work of the Alliance for Housing Solutions continues apace with policy development, advocacy, and public education.

In 2021, AHS educated the community on opportunities for housing diversity through the Missing Middle Housing initiative with web and video resources, and we invited expert speakers to inform our local conversation. We also partnered with the Arlington Community Foundation on the Shared Prosperity project, which focused on coherent strategies to help our lowest-income neighbors—Arlington residents at 30% or less of the area median income.

This year also saw important tenantled efforts in the County to address housing quality at older properties. Problems were remedied and policies and systems were studied to avoid similar issues in the future. For AHS, this work marked a renewed commitment to centering our efforts within the communities we serve and supporting the voices of community and tenant leaders. This year also marked a transition of our dedicated and dynamic Executive Director, Michelle Winters, whose expertise brought AHS an authoritative and powerful voice to help shape the future of affordable housing in our community. We will continue to welcome her voice in new forums and seek her counsel as a national expert with a deep local understanding.

Since our founding, the important work we do is only possible through the care and dedication of supporters like you. Thank you for joining us in working to advance affordable housing in Arlington and for helping make Arlington a thriving community: green, diverse, and interesting in so many ways.

POLICY DEVELOPMENT, COALITION BUILDING, AND ADVOCACY

In 2021, AHS joined forces with community advocates, housing coalitions, and partner organizations to help increase both the supply and quality of affordable housing in Arlington.



Invested in Arlington's Affordability

AHS advocated to double the allocation for the Affordable Housing Investment Fund (AHIF) after the County Manager proposed slashing the fund. The County Board accepted many of our proposed changes, including increasing funding for AHIF.



Supported Efforts to Create Shared Prosperity

Through our partnership with the Arlington Community Foundation, AHS called attention to the mismatch between available subsidized units and needs at various income levels. Our new data visualizations helped communicate the gap to a wide audience from the County Board to the general public.



Advocated for Improved Living Conditions at the Serrano

AHS believes that affordable housing must not only be created but maintained. Together with other groups and individuals, AHS supported residents at the Serrano Apartments who sought to bring attention to unsafe living conditions.

While the COVID-19 pandemic forced us to reimagine some of our plans in 2021, we continued our education and outreach efforts throughout the year in new and innovative ways.

ADVOCATING FOR MISSING MIDDLE HOUSING

AHS supports additional Missing Middle Housing in Arlington and believes it is an important part of making housing more financially attainable throughout our community. In partnership with the Langston Boulevard Alliance, AHS received a Community Impact Grant from Virginia Housing to create new resources on Missing Middle Housing. As the County Board moved forward with a Missing Middle Housing study, AHS used a variety of media to advocate for more diverse housing choice in the County. Our team also provided many civic associations with Missing Middle Housing presentations throughout the year to help drive engagement and action around the issue.








A Commitment to Racial Equity
